## **1** Introduction

This manual is addressed to the applicants and beneficiaries of the Interreg Austria-Hungary 2021-2027 Programme. It intends to provide an overview of the output and result indicators and thus facilitate the selection of indicators for the project.

To this end, the Indicator Manual explains what output and result indicators are, why they are important for the successful implementation of the projects and how they contribute to measuring the achievement of programme targets. The tasks and obligations of the project holders and the consequences of non-compliance are described, and recommendations are given for the selection and implementation of indicators. In the manual each indicator is defined in detail and indicator-specific instructions for their application, measurement and reporting in the projects is provided.

The definitions and numbering are based on the European Commission's staff working document "*Performance, monitoring and evaluation of the European Regional Development Fund, the Cohesion Fund and the Just Transition Fund in 2021-2027*" (SWD(2021) 198 final).

This document is part of a set of manuals, including among others comprehensive information on eligibility of expenditures, indicators, communication and implementation of projects.

### 2 About indicators in general

#### 2.1 The intervention logic

The programme's targets are thematically divided into 4 priorities (P), addressing four policy objectives (PO) of the EU, with a total of 7 specific objectives (SO). Each project must be linked to an SO, in order to be eligible for funding.

Outputs and results of a project contribute to the achievement of the programme targets, and this contribution is measured by output and result indicators preselected by the programme. The Interreg Austria-Hungary 2021-2027 programme uses only standardised common output indicators for Interreg (Annex 1, Table 2 of regulation (EU) 2021/1058).

The intervention logic of a project (activities, targets), their contribution to the system of programme targets, and the related measurements (output and result indicators) must build a sound, consequent and plausible system.

#### 2.2 What are output and result indicators?

The **project output is the outcome of the activities funded**, telling us what has actually been produced for the money given to the project. It should be **captured by a programme output indicator**, and directly contribute to the achievement of the result indicator(s).



The project result is the immediate advantage of carrying out the project, with particular reference to the effects/benefit of using the project outputs for the target groups. The expected result describes the change the project is aiming for by the end of the project or shortly thereafter. Its achievement is more exposed to external factors than in the case of outputs. It should be captured by the relevant programme result indicator.

Applicants shall define project **outputs and results** so that they are both

- characteristic for the expected achievements of the project,
- and are clearly **linked to the relevant predefined** output and result **indicators** of the programme.

Defining project outputs and results in this manner guarantees that the supported projects' success can be properly measured and aggregated on the programme (and the EU) level.

All projects must include **at least one output** linked to a programme output indicator. Each output shall **lead to a project result**, which is linked to one of the programme result indicators.

Please also note, that all project activities shall lead to some **deliverables** that may contribute to the development of project outputs, or be important achievements of the project on their own right, but which are not measured by the programme output indicators. Deliverables are project specific, and not standardised on programme level, therefore they are not subject to this document.

#### 2.3 Why are output and result indicators important?

Output and result indicators make the direct outcomes and positive effects of the projects measurable and visible. For the project owners as well as for the funding programme this enables to check progress during project implementation and to assess actual achievements quantitatively at project closure.

The feasibility of the project work plan, including expected outputs and results and their contribution to the programme indicators are an essential part of the application assessment.

During implementation the progress of the project against the selected targets and its contribution to the programme shall be reported in accordance with the regulation requirements to the European Commission at regular intervals. If appropriate progress cannot be demonstrated, especially if the success of the project could be jeopardised, it can lead to financial consequences.

# **2.4 What does the project holder have to consider regarding the output and result indicators?**

At the application stage, project holders of each project need to choose which programme priority, and within that which programme specific objective their project belongs to. Based on that they shall select the relevant indicators (output and related result indicators) and include a realistic quantification of project targets in the application form. It is important to note that all projects have to contribute to output indicator RCO87 "Organisations co-operating across borders" and to result indicator RCR84 "Organisations cooperating across borders".



During the implementation of the project, the progress and final achievement of these targets have to be reported through periodic activity progress reports, with corresponding evidence of the achievement of the chosen indicators.

As it is of outmost importance for applicants and beneficiaries to understand indicators and how their achievement shall be counted, the Indicator Manual provides a detailed description of all output and result indicators. In addition, your Regional Coordinators and the programme administration will also be happy to advise you on the selection of indicators.
